

Preparing your files for Mastering

Essential Checklist:

☐ Audio files are well named
☐ No audio is clipping (hitting 0dB)
☐ Bit rate is set to 24 bits minimum
☐ Use your source sample rate (if your project is in 44100Hz
don't upsample)
☐ Export audio as WAV or AIFF files
$\hfill \square$ Turn off any compressors or limiters on your master channe
The Extra Mile:
☐ Include 1 or 2 reference tracks

☐ Include your notes/requests in a text document

How to name your files:

Include the artist name, track name and remixer (if it's a remix). For official releases, please also include the release name and catalog number

How much headroom to leave:

Short answer: As long as your audio doesn't hit 0dB it will be fine.

<u>Long answer</u>: to be safe, try to ensure your peak volume (NOT RMS) tends to hit around -3db at the loudest parts. As long as it doesn't pass -0.1dB it is safe for mastering.

If you prefer to keep your master plugins turned on:

No problem! In this case just send me two versions, one with your master chain and one without. I will use the version that brings us the best result.

Choosing a good reference track:

If you want to include a reference track, please note: it should have the same style and groove as your music and most importantly it should be professionally mixed and mastered. Using similar songs from top labels in your genre is a good approach.
